#### <u>Reports:</u>

- The Affordable Housing Bylaw Advisory Committee held their first meeting on Monday August 8<sup>th</sup>. MAPC was present. The Committee set forth the future meeting schedule. On September 20<sup>th</sup>, there will be a roundtable discussion which will be by invitation only and targeted to developers, engineers, attorneys and realtors. Town staff and board members will not attend.
- The Board of Selectmen will be having a Ms4 Permit meeting Monday August 15, 2016. The PEDB will attend.
- There will be a joint meeting with the PEDB and the EDC on Tuesday, August 16, 2016.

# Pine Ridge, Candlewood and Hartney Acres:

Mr. Yorkis was present at the meeting. He provided a memo to the Board dated August 9, 2016. (See Attached) He explained that the public hearing scheduled with the Conservation Commission for July 28<sup>th</sup> did not happen since there was a problem with the advertising. This was not an error on his part. The new hearing date is Thursday, August 25, 2016. Currently, there is \$78,000 plus accrued interest in the bonds for Pine Ridge, Candlewood Drive and Island Road. The scope of work is noted in an email dated July 8, 2016 by Tom Holder. The estimated amount of work is \$74,137.50. Mr. Yorkis indicated that this will take care of the work described in the Pine Ridge Certificate of Action. Once the Order of Condition is issued, work will begin. All contractors are lined up. Mr. Yorkis indicated that Jimmy Smith from the Department of Public Service has been a great help. One issue brought up was the timing of the release of bond when the work is done.

Susy Affleck-Childs asked about the submittal of as built and street acceptance plans after construction is completed. There will need to be a run-down of the title to make sure Mr. Claffey owns the road and is in the position to convey. This is standard practice.

# **Exelon Expansion – Construction Services Estimate from BETA Group:**

The Board is in receipt of an estimate dated August 9, 2016 for \$11,600.00. (See Attached)

On a motion made by Bob Tucker, and Matt Hayes, the Board voted to approve the estimate from Beta in the amount of \$11,600.00. (Member Gay abstained from vote)

#### **Construction Reports:**

Steve Bouley from Tetra Tech conducted a site inspection of Village Estates on August 1, 2016. The contractor installed a RCP pipe for the infiltration trenches. The rest of the work will be complete within the month. The contractor will clean the sand material.

The Chairman would like to make residents aware that there is no work allowed on scenic roads without proper permits. He referred to a project on Fisher Street which involved tree removal. The concern is that the stone wall got rebuilt but the edge of the road was damaged. Consultant Carlucci communicated that some towns go beyond the state Scenic Road statute. The determination is now left to the Tree Warden.

• The Sign Bylaw Task Force continues to discuss whether the sign regulations should remain as a zoning bylaw or be converted to a general bylaw. The committee is also planning some public outreach in the fall 2016.

#### Timbercrest 40B development.

• The applicant will be submitting some conceptual changes since another parcel has been added to the site. The applicant may need to withdrawal and resubmit.

- The Board needs to determine where museums, movie theatre/cinemas and galleries can be located. C1 would make sense.

Susy noted there has been some discussion about establishing some limits on the number of auto supply stores in town. It was discussed that this type of business is economically driven. There was discussion about what type of community the Board would like Town of Medway to look like. The Board can help with the appearance of the projects through the design review process but the Board cannot determine who buys the buildings. The members are in support of requiring a special permit for retail store larger than 20,000 sq. feet.

The members will discuss the remainder of the table of uses chart at another meeting along with discussion on the dimensional regulations.

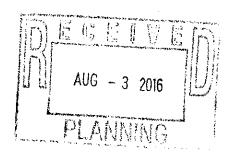

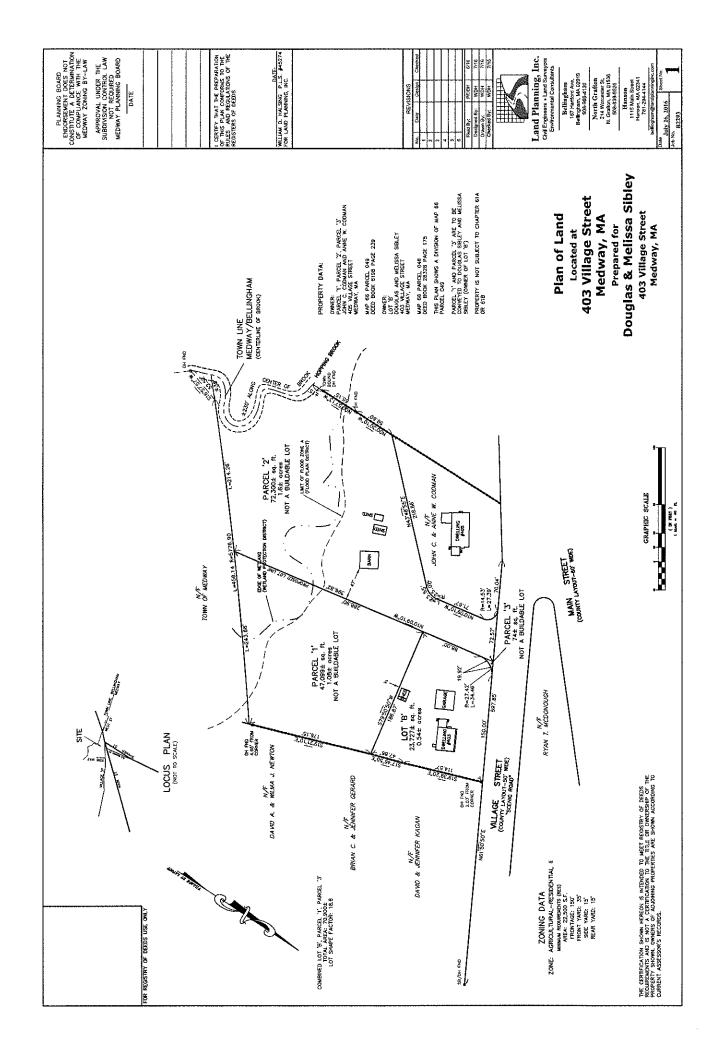

I have reviewed the ANR plan submitted for endorsement by Doug and Melissa Sibley of Medway. The current owners of the property are John and Anne Codman of Medway. The plan was prepared by Land Planning, Inc. of Bellingham, and is dated July 26, 2016. The plan proposes to divide a parcel of 119,473 square feet into three parcels of 47,099 square feet (Parcel 1), 72,300 square feet (Parcel 2) and 74 square feet (Parcel 3).

Parcels 1 and 3 are to be conveyed from the Codmans to the Sibleys.

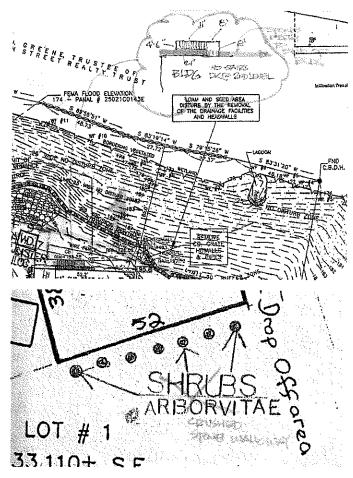

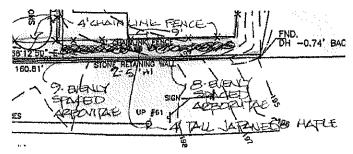

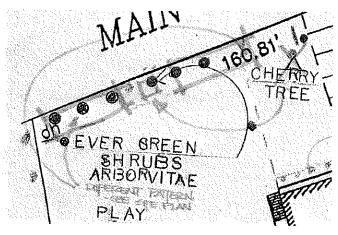
I visited the Learning Tree site for the purpose of reviewing the plan with what is on the ground, Tuesday, August 2<sup>nd</sup>, at 4:30pm. What I found was that the basic plan has been executed with just a few subtle differences... while I do not believe those differences to be significant, following below is highlighted documentation.

At the rear of the building the stairway to the outside stairway to the second floor is slightly different in position and layout than shown on the site plan (I'm assuming that was something cleared through normal building inspection) and the row of arborvitaes shown on the hand-drawn landscape plan has been replaced by a gravel path. The absence of plantings is not a big deal in my opinion because of the total shade from bordering woodland/slope and no visibility to abutters.

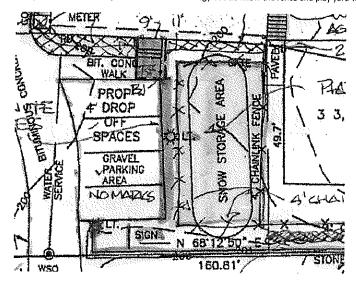


At the front of the property along the play-yard fence the planting is slightly different than specified by the landscape plan. It does approximate what was intended and will provide intended screening once the plants mature.

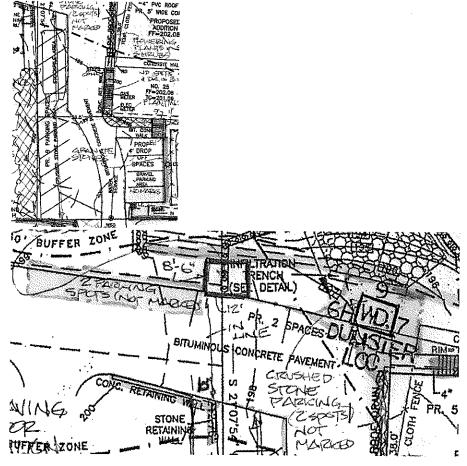




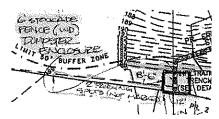
The "snow storage area" shown on the plan at the front of the property is actually a fenced in play yard. Owner indicated that the fence existed before the project. The play yard would not be used in the bad weather when snow would be an issue so even though snow could not be "plowed" into that area it could be scooped. Don't know the particulars of that strategy but do know the fence and play yard was not shown on the site plan.



While pavement and gravel parking and driving areas are essentially properly shown, the following two things should be noted... all pavement is in poor condition (was not replaced as part of the project) and there are no "striped" parking spots because they are all on gravel. The number of spots indicated are provided as evidenced by cars occupying them as well as two additional spots at the back of the building and the 2 remaining spots moved east to accommodate dumpster location.



Lastly, the dumpster enclosure changed location and configuration from the site and design plan. It has been moved away from the building, has been assembled using standard 6ft cedar stockade fence and is slightly larger than originally indicated.



As stated earlier... the "modifications" are not drastic, everything is in keeping with the intent of the original documents and I found nothing that made me nervous. Not sure if we have to insist on corrections before endorsing... would be happy to just have these notes kept on file.

- I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION The applicant/property owner proposes to construct a two story, 52' x 40' addition (4,160 sq. ft.) to the back/south of the existing 1,352 sq. ft. child care facility. The addition will provide classroom space on the upper level and an indoor play area on the lower level. Planned site improvements include stormwater drainage, exterior lighting, landscaping, and measures to ensure protection of adjacent wetland resources. The site is .76 acres in size. The parcel has rights to use a 20 foot wide right of way on the adjacent property at 155 Main Street to Evergreen Street. The proposed use is a child care facility which is an exempt use under the Massachusetts Zoning Act so it is allowed in any zoning district in the community. However, it is subject to "reasonable regulations concerning the bulk and height of structures and determining yard sizes, lot area, setbacks, open space, parking and building coverage requirements."
- II. VOTE OF THE BOARD After reviewing the application and information gathered during the public hearing and review process, the Medway Planning and Economic Development Board, on July 22, 2014, on a motion made by Robert Tucker and seconded by Matthew Hayes, voted by roll call to APPROVE with WAIVERS and CONDITIONS as specified herein, the site plan application of Stephen Hansen of Natick, MA for an addition and site improvements at the Learning Tree Center at 157 Main Street. The vote was five in favor and zero opposed.

- B. During the course of the review, the Applicant and its representatives submitted revised plans and a variety of other materials to the Planning and Economic Development Board as follows:
  - 1. Updated Site Plan of Land in Medway, MA, revised May 21, 2014 prepared by Sullivan Surveying Company, LLC of Natick, MA
  - 2. Letter dated May 27, 2014 from Medway Inspector of Buildings John Emidy confirming that the scope of proposed work at 157 Main Street constitutes a *major site plan* pursuant to the Medway Zoning Bylaw.
  - 3. Quitclaim Deed conveying 157 Main Street from Michael and Jeannie Buxbaum to 157 Main Street Realty LLC, dated June 17, 2013, recorded at Norfolk County Registry of Deeds June 17, 2013 in Book 31442, Page 467.

- VI. FINDINGS The Planning and Economic Development Board must determine whether the proposed project constitutes a suitable development based on conformance with the purposes of Site Plan Review as specified in the Zoning Bylaw and with the various site development standards and criteria set forth in the Site Plan Rules and Regulations. The preceding Special and General Conditions included in this Decision shall assure that the Planning Board's approval of this site plan is consistent with the Site Plan Rules and Regulations, that the comments of various Town boards and public officials have been adequately addressed, and that concerns of abutters and other town residents which were aired during the public hearing process have been carefully considered.

The Planning and Economic Development Board, at its meeting on July 22, 2014, on a motion made by Robert Tucker and seconded by Matthew Hayes, voted by roll call to approve the following *FINDINGS* regarding the site plan application for The Learning Tree Center at 157 Main Street. The motion was approved by a vote of five in favor and zero against.

#### A. ZONING BYLAW - Section V. C - Site Plan Review & Approval

(1) Are the buildings, uses and site amenities properly located on the development site in relation to the terrain and scale of other buildings in the vicinity and adjacent neighborhoods?

The project is an addition to the rear of the existing building. It is properly located since it needs to be attached to the existing building and the location to

- the rear meets all setback requirements. The addition does not interfere with existing site features such as driveways, parking and play areas.
- (2) Are the construction and renovation of buildings and the installation of site amenities thoughtfully designed to reflect or be compatible with Medway's New England architectural style as further detailed in the *Design Guidelines*?
  - The design of the addition has been reviewed by the Design Review Committee (DRC) in light of the Medway Design Guidelines, and the changes recommended by the DRC have been incorporated into the revised building and site design. Some of the changes include adding dormers, a cupola, and shutters and changing roof pitches.
- (3) Are adjacent and neighboring properties protected from nuisance and harmful effects caused by noise, fumes, and the glare of headlights and other light sources generated by uses on the development site?
  - As shown in the lighting plan dated July 10, 2014, there will be no spillage of light beyond the property boundaries. No fumes (other than from automobiles) will be generated on site. The existing driveways will be used for access and egress so no new headlight glare problem is created. Also, abutting uses on either side are commercial.
- (4) Are significant natural features on a development site (i.e. hills, water bodies, wetlands, trees, tree groves, wooded areas, rock outcrops, native plants, wildlife habitats, and other areas of aesthetic and ecological interest) preserved with as minimal site disturbance as possible?
  - As the site is already developed, disturbance of natural features is minimal. There are wetlands to the rear of the property. These will not be disturbed, and an Order of Conditions has been obtained from the Conservation Commission ensuring that any impacts are minimal.
- (5) Are off-street loading facilities and methods for unloading vehicles, goods, products materials and equipment incidental to the normal operation of the establishment(s) on the development site conveniently and safely provided while the visual intrusion thereof is appropriately screened from public view?
  - As a child care facility, it is the loading and unloading of children that constitute the primary cause of concern. The facility has dedicated parking spaces for loading and unloading of children. Also, the parking spaces as well as the egress and ingress plan have been reviewed by the Town's Consulting Engineer and Safety Officer, and the Safety Officer has recommended that traffic enter the site from Evergreen Street and exit onto Main Street (with right turn only allowed onto Main Street). These measures will minimize safety concerns.

- (6) Are facilities for the storage, handling and disposal of sewage, refuse and other solid wastes resulting from the normal operations of the establishment(s) on the development site provided and adequately screened from public view?
  - The facility is served by Town sewer so it is handled adequately. As conditioned (See Condition #4A), a dumpster will be located on the site and adequately screened.
- (7) Are pedestrian ways, access driveways, loading and parking facilities properly designed for the convenience and safety of customers, employees and the general public?
  - The plan has been reviewed by Town's Public Safety Officer as well as the Town's Consulting Engineer and Consulting Planner. The access driveways, loading and parking facilities have been found to be adequately designed.
- (8) Is convenient and safe access for fire-fighting and emergency rescue vehicles provided to and within the development site in relation to adjacent streets?
  - The site provides access from two streets. The plan has been reviewed and approved by the Town's Fire Chief and Safety Officer.
- (9) Are satisfactory methods for drainage of surface water to and from the development site provided?
  - The drainage plan has been reviewed by the Town's Consulting Engineer and has been found to meet applicable stormwater management standards, and is adequate for the site.
- (10) Are public ways and private drives properly designed to be constructed to serve the intended use and provide an adequate level of service in relation to the traffic to be generated by the development site?
  - The public ways and private drives serving the site are already in existence and have been used for this use for several years. While the intensity of the use will be increased, the ways and drives have been reviewed by the Town's Consulting Engineer, DPS Director, Fire Chief and Police Chief, including the impact of the redeveloped Route 109. The Safety Officer has recommended a one-way traffic pattern through the site with ingress from Evergreen Street and egress onto Main Street via right-turn only. The one-way pattern will accommodate the increased use of the site.
- (11) Have the effects and impacts of the proposed use of land or structures on vehicular and pedestrian traffic, municipal services and utilities, roadways, parking, drainage, environmental quality, water resources, signage, lighting, and community economics, character, values, amenities and appearance been identified and evaluated?

Main Street (Route 109) and Evergreen Street are adequate for the proposed use. Municipal services are adequate to serve the proposed facility, which already exists but is being expanded. The quantity of on-site parking is adequate for the proposed use. Drainage is in compliance with Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Stormwater Management Guidelines for a redevelopment project. The site was designed to minimize impacts on environmental quality and water resources and the project has been issued an Order of Conditions from the Conservation Commission. No additional signage is proposed, but would be subject to review and compliance with the sign provisions of the Zoning Bylaw. Lighting is in compliance with the lighting provisions of the Zoning Bylaw as indicated in the lighting plan dated July 10, 2014. The building and site design has been approved by the Design Review Committee which has provided a positive Letter of Recommendation. The facility will not have a detrimental impact on community economics and may have a positive impact by expanding the child care service it provides. The amenities and appearance of the site will improve with the addition. As an existing use, this development expanding the use will not detract from the character and values of the area.

(12) Have site design modifications been proposed and evaluated to lessen the negative and harmful impacts?

The site plan has been reviewed by Town officials and the Town's Consulting Engineers and Consulting Planner. Modifications were suggested and the applicant has responded positively to those comments with a revised plan. The revised plan has been reviewed and the applicant has addressed each of the comments received.

(13) Have reasonable conditions, limits, safeguards and mitigation measures been established?

Specific reasonable conditions have been included in Sections VIII and IX of this Site Plan Decision.

(14) Is the applicant providing sidewalks along the entire frontage of the subject property along existing Town ways (Main Street)

The applicant is not providing a sidewalk along the frontage of the property. However, sidewalks will be installed as part of the Route 109 redevelopment project so the installation of a sidewalk now that does not connect to anything would serve no useful purpose and would be a waste of resources.

- B. ZONING BYLAW SECTION V. USE REGULATIONS. Sub-Section P. Exempt Uses. 1. Child Care Facility
- (15) The structure and lot containing the child care facility shall meet the dimensional requirements (lot area; lot width; building height; front, side and rear yard setbacks; and lot coverage) for the zoning district in which the facility is to be

located unless the structure is a legally pre-existing, non-conforming building or structure.

The lot, existing structure and proposed addition meet the dimensional requirements of the Zoning Bylaw for the Agricultural Residential II zoning district.

(16) Open Space – A fenced outdoor play area set back a minimum of fifteen (15) feet from any abutting land shall be provided.

A fenced play area suitably buffered from the abutting property already exists on the site. The abutting property owner of 159 Main Street has submitted a letter of no objection to this project.

#### (17) Parking

- One off-street parking space with a minimum dimension of 8 x 18 feet shall be provided for every paid and unpaid employee, not resident on the premises so that there is no on-street parking for employees.

  This requirement is met and there is no on-street parking proposed.
- No space shall be considered available for parking which reduces the effective width of a driveway providing access to the site/building. No spaces are considered available for parking that reduces the effective width of the driveway.
- No parking area shall be located nearer than 15 feet of the property line of an adjoining residential lot Parking spaces along the easterly side of the lot are less than 15 from the adjoining lot; however, the lot is not used for residential purposes and there is a line of mature shrubs on the abutting property that provides considerable screening.
- The 15 buffer area of an off-street parking area shall be substantially screened from abutting properties through the installation of suitable landscaping and/or fencing materials.
   As noted above, the off-street parking area does not abut a residential lot so this requirement is not applicable.
- So as to not interfere with traffic patterns and flow, there shall be provided a separate on-site drop off and pick up parking area capable of accommodating at least the number of vehicles equal to 1/3 the licenses capacity of the child care facility. Such area shall be exclusive of drive aisles.

There is a separate on-site pick up and drop off area. The number of spaces provided is less than required to accommodate 1/3 of the projected license capacity of the expanded facility. However, Sub-Section P of SECTION V. of the Zoning Bylaw provides the Board with the discretion

to vary these requirements and the Board finds that the number of parking spaces provided for pick up and drop off is adequate considering the irregular timing for pick up and drop off.

- There shall be a separate entrance and exit areas for vehicles to access the parking and drop off/pick up areas.

  The site plan, as conditioned (See Condition VIII. C), provides for a one-way traffic pattern through the site with an entrance from Evergreen Street and an exit on Main Street (right turn only).
- (18) Adequate provisions for on-site retention and treatment of stormwater shall be provided.

The drainage system for the site has been reviewed and approved as adequate under the Massachusetts Stormwater Management rules for redevelopment projects.

(19) Lighting used to illuminate a parking area shall meet the provisions of SECTION V. USE REGULATIONS, Sub-Section B. Area Standards, 3. B).

As shown on the revised lighting plan dated July 10, 2014, the project meets the lighting standards of Section V. USE REGULATIONS, Sub-Section B. Area Standards, 3. B.

- C. SITE PLAN RULES AND REGULATIONS The Planning and Economic Development Board shall determine whether the proposed development is in conformance with the standards and criteria set forth in the Rules and Regulations, unless specifically waived. In making its decision, the Planning and Economic Development Board shall determine the following:
- (20) Has internal circulation, queuing and egress been designed such that traffic safety is protected, access via minor streets servicing residential areas is minimized, and traffic backing up into the public way is minimized?

As conditioned (See Condition VIII. C.), internal circulation will be in the form of a one-way traffic flow pattern with ingress from Evergreen Street and egress to Main Street as recommended by the Safety Officer. No backing onto a public way is needed.

(21) Does the site plan show designs that minimize any departure from the character, materials, and scale of buildings in the vicinity as viewed from public ways and places?

The design of the addition has been reviewed and approved by the Design Review Committee and is not a departure from the character, materials and scale of buildings in the vicinity.

(22) Is reasonable use made of building location, grading and vegetation to reduce the visible intrusion of structures, parking areas, outside storage or other outdoor service areas (e.g. waste removal) from public views or from (nearby) premises residentially used and zoned.

The addition is located directly behind the existing building so the visual intrusion is minimal. The outdoor facilities are mostly already existing to the rear of the building so the visual intrusion is minimal.

(23) Is adequate access to each structure for fire and service equipment provided?

The Fire Chief has reviewed and approved the site design.

- (24) Will the design and construction minimize, to the extent reasonably possible, the following environmental impacts?
  - a) the volume of cut and fill;
  - b) the number of trees to be removed with particular care taken with mature trees and root systems;
  - c) the visual prominence of man-made elements not necessary for safety;
  - d) the removal of existing stone walls;
  - e) the visibility of building sites from existing streets;
  - f) the impacts on waterways and environmental resource areas;
  - g) soil pollution and erosion;
  - h) noise.

As a redevelopment project, the environmental impacts of the project are minimal. The most significant potential impacts have been addressed in the form of an Order of Conditions from the Conservation Commission. The stormwater management system has also been reviewed and approved by the Town's Consulting Engineer. Vary little visual impact will result since the addition is to the rear of the existing building and the outdoor elements already exist.

(25) Is pedestrian and vehicular safety both on the site and egressing from it maximized?

The plan has been reviewed by Town's Public Safety Officer as well as the Town's Consulting Engineer and Consulting Planner. The access driveways, loading and parking facilities have been found to be adequately designed, and will use a one-way pattern entering from Evergreen Street and exiting on Main Street. As conditioned, internal site traffic directional signage shall be added to the plan further enhancing safety.

(26) Does the design and will the construction incorporate, to the maximum extent possible, the visual prominence of natural and historic features of the site?

The design incorporates the existing natural and man-made visual features by locating the addition to the rear of the existing building and retaining most of the outdoor features as they are.

- (27) Does the lighting of structures and parking area avoid glare on adjoining properties and minimize light pollution within the town?
  - As shown on the revised lighting plan dated July 10, 2014, the project meets the lighting standards of Section V. USE REGULATIONS, Sub-Section B. Area Standards, 3. B., and there will be no glare on adjoining properties.
- (28) Is the proposed limit of work area reasonable and does it protect sensitive environmental and/or cultural resources? The site plan as designed should not cause substantial or irrevocable damage to the environment, which damage could be avoided or ameliorated through an alternative development plan or mitigation measures.

The Order of Conditions issued by the Conservation Commission ensures that the environmental resources of the site are protected. No cultural resources are impacted.

#### D. OTHER FINDINGS

- (29) Due to the significant increase in capacity, the applicant agrees to manage the drop-off and pickup times for the children in order to minimize traffic backups that may impact Route 109. The one-way pattern will address this issue by ensuring that any queuing does not occur on Route 109.
- (30) Estimated new maximum capacity increase from 36 children to 80.
- (31) The existing building at 157 Main Street was constructed in 1983 as a child care facility and has been used exclusively for this purpose since then.
- (32) The deed for the subject property includes the right of the owner of the property to use the right-of-way on the adjacent property at 155 Main Street to connect to Evergreen Street.
- Walvers At its July 22, 2014 meeting, the Planning and Economic Development Board, on a motion made by Robert Tucker and seconded by Matthew Hayes, voted by roll call to approve granting waivers from the following provisions of the Rules and Regulations for the Submission and Approval of Site Plans, as amended December 3, 2002 EXEPT for a waiver from Section 204-5 A. Site Plan Contents Cover Sheet which the Board did not approve. The Planning and Economic Development Board's action and reasons for granting or denying each waiver request are listed below. All waivers are subject to the Special and General Conditions of Approval, which follow this section. The motion was approved by a vote of five in favor and zero against.

### SUBMITTAL REQUIREMENTS/PLAN CONTENTS

1. 204-3 A. 7) – A written Development Impact Statement shall be prepared. It shall describe the potential and anticipated impacts of the proposed development, identify all positive and adverse impacts, and propose an acceptable program to

prevent or mitigate adverse impacts. The Development Impact Statement shall address traffic, environmental, community and parking impacts.

The project is an expansion of an existing use on a site that is already developed. Increasing the building by 2080 square feet will have a minimal impact on the community so this requirement is waived.

2. 204-5 A. Site Plan Contents Cover Sheet – The Cover Sheet shall include the project name, name and address of owner, name and address of applicant, name and address of engineering and other professional firms responsible for the plan, current date, list of revision dates, project street address, project Assessor's Map and parcel number, zoning district classification, list of requested waivers from the Site Plan Rules and Regulations, Planning Board signature block and a list of drawings/contents

The information provided by the applicant includes most or all of the required information so it is not unreasonable to prepare a specific cover sheet with the required information. Therefore this waiver is hereby denied.

3. 204-5 B. Site Plan Contents Context Sheet – Items 1 – 6.

The applicant provided sufficient information about the context of the development. Therefore, due to the scale of the project, the requirement for a Context Sheet is waived.

4. 204-5 C. Site Plan Contents Existing Condition Sheet(s) - Items 1 - 5

The applicant provided sufficient information about existing conditions on the site such that the Board was able to fully understand what existing on site and how that was going to change. Therefore, due to the scale of the project, the requirement for an Existing Conditions Sheet is waived.

5. 204-5 D. 7) – Site Plan Contents Landscape Architectural Plan - A Landscape Architectural Plan shall be prepared by a Landscape Architect licensed in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. This Plan shall be prepared as an overlay of the existing conditions sheets and shall incorporate, whenever possible, the significant features of the existing site and topography, particularly existing trees with a diameter of one (1) foot or greater at four (4) feet above grade. The Landscape Architectural Plan shall indicate the areas slated for excavation; any woodlands, trees or other existing features or structures to be retained; all new plantings by common and Latin name including their proposed locations and sizes at the time of installation. Plan graphics for tree canopies shall reflect, as closely as possible, the actual canopy dimension of proposed tree plantings at the time of installation with a "lesser" intensity graphic used to represent potential canopy at maturity.

Very few trees are being disturbed by the addition which will be constructed in the current back yard of the existing building. Due to the scale of the project, a Landscape Architectural Plan prepared by a Landscape Architect would be of little use. The applicant did provide information about the existing and proposed vegetation on the site. Therefore, this requirement is waived.

6. 204-5 D. 12) – Site Plan Contents Signage Plan - The plan shall include the design, location, materials, dimensions and lighting for a) the proposed development and all building identification both freestanding and attached; and b) standards for tenant signs.

The applicant has stated that there would be no change in signage for this project. Therefore, there is no need for a signage plan and this requirement is waived.

7. 204-5 D. 14) – Site Plan Contents Horizontal Sight Distances – Horizontal Sight distances shall be shown on the public ways at all entrances in both directions.

The driveway that exits onto Route 109 has existed for many years and is not being changed. The sight distance at the driveway is clearly adequate based on a site visit so there is no need to document this with a traffic engineer. This requirement is waived.

8. 204-5 D. 16) Site Plan Contents – Fire Equipment – Locations of proposed fire hydrants, fire alarm boxes, fire lanes and access for equipment shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Fire Department.

No additional fire equipment is proposed and the Fire Department has approved the project so this requirement is waived.

9. 205-6 A. Parking – Parking lots should be located to the side or rear of the lot. Placement of parking areas should not be near a high volume of traffic where it can obstruct traffic flow. Parking should be hidden to the maximum extent possible and located near the side and rear of the site. Parking should not create a hazard to abutters, vehicles or pedestrians. Where or when parking does exist near the street, plantings or appropriate fences, i.e. picket or post and rail, should be incorporated into the design to screen parking areas and reduce their visual impact.

Some of the parking for this site is to the side but some is also in front of the site. However, this is an existing condition that is not being changed by this project. A stone wall across the front of site provides some screening of the parking. Due to the existing condition and the scale of the project, this requirement is waived.

- VIII. SPECIFIC CONDITIONS This approval is subject to the following Specific Conditions:
  - A. **Plan Revisions** Prior to endorsement, the site plan set for The Learning Tree Center shall be further revised as follows and submitted to the Planning and Economic Development Board for review and approval.

- 1. A Cover Sheet shall be provided to include all items specified in the *Site Plan Rules and Regulations* except that the signature box shall be for the Planning and Economic Development Board.
- 2. A detail showing an enclosure for the dumpster located behind the building shall be included in the final plan. The enclosure design shall be to the satisfaction of the Planning and Economic Development Board
- 3. The landscaping plan shall be further revised to specify the landscape plantings to be installed in the area behind the new addition and in the area on Main Street located between the playground fencing and the stone wall. The landscape plantings shall provide 4 season, evergreen screening and shall be non-invasive species.
- 4. The site plan shall be revised to show the following:
  - a. A location for dumpster
  - b. Location of on-site traffic directional signs
- 5. The cover sheet, site plan, landscaping plan, lighting plan, and building elevation plans shall be combined into one plan set with all sheets being the same size.

#### B. Parking

- 1. Customers and employees shall not park in the right-of-way access driveway from Evergreen Street. Contingent upon approval of the owners of 155 Main Street, *No Parking* signs and one way inbound traffic signs for the Learning Tree Center shall be installed in the right of way area on their property.
- Handicap parking spaces shall be specifically designated and shall be in compliance with current ADA and Mass Architectural Access Board requirements.
- 3. The parking area closest to the main entry for Learning Tree Center Drop off parking area shall be clearly designated.

# C. Traffic Access/Egress

- 1. The right of way off of Evergreen Street across the back of 155 Main Street shall be used for vehicular access to The Learning Tree Center.
- 2. Egress from the site shall be by right turn (eastbound) only onto Main Street
- D. Signage Any changes in the free-standing signage for The Learning Tree Center and any proposal for additional signage shall be reviewed and approved by the Medway Design Review Committee before the Town issues any sign permit.

#### VIII. GENERAL CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

A. Plan Endorsement - Within thirty (30) days after the Planning and Economic Development Board has filed its Decision with the Town Clerk, the Applicant shall submit a final site plan modification reflecting all Conditions and required

revisions, if any, to the Planning and Economic Development Board to review for compliance with the Board's *Decision*. The Applicant shall provide one set of the revised site plan in its final form to the Planning and Economic Development Board for signature/endorsement. All plan sheets shall be bound together in a complete set.

- B. Fees Prior to site plan endorsement by the Planning and Economic Development Board, the Applicant shall pay:
  - 1. the balance of any outstanding plan review fees owed to the Town for review of the site plan by the Town's engineering, planning or other consultants; and
  - 2. any construction inspection fee required by the Planning and Economic Development Board; and
  - 3. any other outstanding expenses or obligations due the Town of Medway pertaining to this property, including real estate and personal property taxes and business licenses.

The Applicant's failure to pay these fees in their entirety shall be reason for the Planning and Economic Development Board to withhold plan endorsement.

#### C. During Construction

- 1. The applicant shall take all measures necessary to ensue that no excessive dust leaves the premises during construction.
- 2. There shall be no tracking of construction materials onto any public way. Daily sweeping of roadways adjacent to the site shall be done to ensure that loose gravel/dirt does not create hazardous or deleterious conditions for vehicles, pedestrians or abutting residents. In the event construction debris is carried onto a public way, the Applicant shall be responsible for all clean-up of the roadway within twenty-four (24) hours of its occurrence.
- 3. All erosion and siltation control measures shall be installed and observed by the Planning and Economic Development Board's consulting engineer or the Conservation Agent prior to the start of construction, and maintained in good repair throughout the construction period.
- 4. Construction Time Construction work at the site and in the building shall commence no earlier than 7 a.m. and shall cease no later than 7 p.m. No construction shall take place on Sundays or legal holidays.
- 5. Construction Traffic/Parking All parking for construction vehicles and construction related traffic shall be maintained on site. No parking of construction and construction related vehicles shall take place on adjacent public or private ways.
- D. Other Town Permits The contractor for the applicant or assigns shall obtain, pay and comply with all other required Town permits.

#### E. Construction Inspection

- 1. Planning and Economic Development Board members, its staff and consultants, and other designated Town agents and staff shall have the right to inspect the site at any time, for compliance with the endorsed site plan and the provisions of this Decision.
- 2. The applicant shall have a professional engineer licensed in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts conduct progress inspections of the approved plan. Inspections shall occur at least on a monthly basis. The engineer shall prepare a written report of each inspection and provide a copy to the Planning and Economic Development Board within 5 days of inspection.
- 3. In the event the applicant seeks an occupancy permit from the Town of Medway before all site plan work is satisfactorily completed (see VIII. General Conditions of Approval G. 2 herein), the Applicant shall establish a construction inspection account with the Medway Planning and Economic Development Board. The Applicant shall pay a construction inspection fee to the Town of Medway in an amount to be determined by the Planning and Economic Development Board. The funds may be used at the Planning and Economic Development Board's discretion to retain professional outside consultants to:
  - inspect the site
  - identify what site plan work remains to be completed
  - prepare a bond estimate
  - conduct other reasonable inspections until the site work is completed and determined to be satisfactory
  - review as-built plans, and advise the Board as it prepares to issue a *Certificate of Site Plan Completion* (see VIII. General Condition G. 3 herein).

Depending on the scope of professional outside consultant assistance that the Planning and Economic Development Board may need, the Applicant shall be required to provide supplemental payments to the project's construction inspection account, upon invoice. Any funds remaining in the applicant's construction inspection account after the *Certificate of Site Plan Completion* is issued shall be returned to the applicant.

#### F. Plan Modification

- 1. This Site Plan Approval is subject to all subsequent conditions that may be imposed by other Town departments, boards, agencies or commissions. Any changes to the site plan that may be required by the decisions of other Town boards, agencies or commissions shall be submitted to the Planning and Economic Development Board for review as site plan modifications pursuant to SECTION V. C. 10 of the Medway Zoning Bylaw.
- 2. Any work that deviates from an approved site plan shall be a violation of the *Medway Zoning Bylaw*, unless the Applicant requests approval of a plan modification pursuant to SECTION V. C. 10 of the *Medway Zoning*

- Bylaw and such approval is provided in writing by the Planning and Economic Development Board.
- 3. Whenever additional reviews by the Planning and Economic Development Board, its staff or consultants are necessary due to proposed site plan modifications, the Applicant shall be billed and be responsible for all supplemental costs including filing fees, plan review fees and all costs associated with another public hearing including legal notice and abutter notification. If the proposed revisions affect only specific limited aspects of the site, the Planning and Economic Development Board may reduce the scope of the required review and waive part of the filing and review fees.

#### G. Plan Compliance

- 1. The Applicant shall construct all improvements in compliance with the approved and endorsed site plan and any modifications thereto.
- 2. The Planning and Economic Development Board or its agent(s) shall use all legal options available to it, including referring any violation to the Building Commissioner/Zoning Enforcement Officer for appropriate enforcement action, to ensure compliance with the foregoing Conditions of Approval.
- 3. The Conditions of Approval are enforceable under Section. V. C. 12 of the *Medway Zoning Bylaw* (non-criminal disposition) and violations or non-compliance are subject to the appropriate fine.

#### H. Project Completion/Performance Security

- 1. Site plan approval shall lapse after one (1) year of the grant thereof if substantial use has not commenced except for good cause. Approved site plans shall be completed by the applicant or its assignees within two (2) years of the date of plan endorsement. Upon receipt of a written request by the applicant filed at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of expiration, the Planning and Economic Development Board may grant an extension for good cause. The request shall state the reasons for the extension and also the length of time requested. If no request for extension is filed and approved, the site plan approval shall lapse and may be reestablished only after a new filing, hearing and decision.
- 2. No occupancy permit shall be granted until the Planning and Economic Development Board has provided a written communication to the Inspector of Buildings to verify that the project, as constructed, conforms to the approved site plan and any conditions including construction of any required on and off-site improvements, have been satisfactorily completed OR that suitable security/performance guarantee has been provided to the Town of Medway, to the Planning and Economic Development Board's satisfaction, to cover the costs of all remaining work.
- 3. Prior to issuance of a final occupancy permit, the Applicant shall secure a *Certificate of Site Plan Completion* from the Planning and Economic Development Board and provide the *Certificate* to the Inspector of

Buildings. The *Certificate* serves as the Planning and Economic Development Board's confirmation that the completed work conforms to the approved site plan and any conditions and modifications thereto, including the construction of any required on and off-site improvements. The *Certificate* also serves to release any security/performance guarantee that has been provided to the Town of Medway. To secure a *Certificate* of Site Plan Completion, the applicant shall:

- a) provide the Planning and Economic Development Board with written certification from a Professional Engineer registered in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts that all building and site work has been completed in strict compliance with the approved and endorsed site plan, and any modifications thereto; and
- b) submit an electronic version of an As-Built Plan, prepared by a registered Professional Land Surveyor or Engineer registered in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the Planning and Economic Development Board for its review and approval. The As-Built Plan shall show actual as-built locations and conditions of all work shown on the original site plan and any modifications thereto. The final As-Built Plan shall also be provided to the Town in an electronic format as may be specified by the Board of Assessors.
- I. Construction Standards All construction shall be completed in full compliance with all applicable local, state and federal laws, including but not limited to the Americans with Disabilities Act and the regulations of the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board for handicap accessibility.
- J. Conflicts If there is a conflict between the site plan and the Decision's Conditions of Approval, the Decision shall rule. If there is a conflict between this Decision and/or site plan and the Medway Zoning Bylaw, the Bylaw shall apply.

X. APPEAL – Appeals if any, from this Decision shall be made to the court within twenty (20) days of the date the Decision is filed with the Town Clerk.

After the appeal period has expired, the applicant must obtain a certified notice from the Town Clerk that no appeals have been made and provide such certification to the Planning and Economic Development Board before plan endorsement.

The Chairman opened the meeting at 7:00 pm.

There were no Citizen Comments.

### Medway Gardens - Status of Site Plan Implementation

The Board was in receipt of the following: (See Attached)

- Email from Susy Affleck-Childs to Joe Avelling dated 6-7-16.
- Tetra Tech inspection report dated 6-8-16.
- Medway Gardens Site Nan Decision dated 8-23-14.
- Medway Garden Site Plan dated 8-21-14

Mr. Joe Avellino, owner of Medway Gardens, was present to update the Board on the status of the site plan implementation.

The Chairman informed Mr. Avellino that he is not in compliance with the site plan decision which was issued to Medway Gardens on July 2014. It is not apparent that any work has been done.

### **#1 Item Proposed Bituminous Pavement:**

The pavement apron will be installed no later than November 1, 2016.

### #2 Item Proposed Bituminous Pavement Parking Area:

The applicant indicated that the pavement parking to the south will be financially difficult. He would like to seek a waiver to not install this. He communicated that this area is being maintained and has a solid surface for handicap customers.

Consultant Carlucci noted that the plan shows three handicap parking spots and 15 regular parking spots. If there is a variation from this plan, a modification will be needed.

### #3 Item proposed pavement markings and striping:

The applicant wants a modification from the markings. Mr. Avellino noted that the striping will not be done as the paving is gravel and it just doesn't work.

### **#4 Item Proposed Directional and Accessible Signs:**

There was discussion about signs. It was noted that the temporary Medway Gardens banner sign needs to come down. Mr. Avellino responded that the Medway Garden sign will be removed, but noted that the Building Inspector has not asked him to take this sign down. Some of the other signs are seasonal and pertain to horticultural products. The applicant noted that he is exempt due to their agricultural use. The Board asked for clarity about the agricultural use in relation to commercial properties. Consultant Carlucci noted that there is a rule about the agricultural exemption applying to properties over 2 acres in size.

### **#5 Item Proposed Concrete Wheel Stops:**

These will be installed no later than 8/31/16.

The applicant agreed to provide a new set of plans by September 1, 2016.

The Board is in agreement that the applicant will need to seek a plan modification. The modification deadline will be September 1 2016 for the application to be submitted.

### <u>OTHER BUSINESS:</u>

The Board will be working to prioritize warrant articles for the November 2016 town meeting. Some of the items on the priority list include: Village Residential, refining definitions, updating the Use Table and addressing a series of dimensional regulations including the C1 setbacks.

### Rte. 109 Pre-Construction Meeting:

Member Gay updated the Board on his attendance at the recent Rt. 109 pre-construction meeting. The Board was made aware that the 109 Committee has asked Town staff to prepare a

positioning document to address the mismatches which will take place from the construction project, for example, the removal of 64 trees with replacement of only some of those trees. How does the Town respond to this different treatment of a situation for a municipal project vs. a private project? Tom reported that the side road/cross street work will take place in a couple of weeks. There are no official detour routes determined yet. There is a commitment by the contractor to keep the Main Street open during commuting hours.

NOTE - Member Gay excused himself from the meeting at 7:25 pm.

The Exelon public hearing continuation was opened at 7:30 pm. The focus of the hearing is to review the revised site plan along with discussion on the draft decision.

Mark Rogers, Exelon Communication
Bob Tynan, Exelon Construction Manager

Consultant Andrew Ogilvic from Beta Group was also present. He indicated that the items regarding the fuel delivery and snow storage have been addressed. Mr. Ogilvie wants to make sure the snow melts back to road since there could be a risk of fuel dripping off idling trucks.

Member Di Iulio wants to make sure this does not head toward wetlands.

Consultant Las responded that the road will be pitched back enough that there is no risk to the wetlands.

Consultant Carlucci informed the Board that all of his issues have been addressed and resolved.

The letter from the Design Review Committee dated July 12, 2016 was presented to the Board. Chairman Rodenhiser attended the 7-11-16 DRC meeting and informed the Board that the DRC would still like to see a two tone color arrangement on the sound wall.

Attorney Kwesell informed the Board that the applicant was not made aware of the 7-11-16 DRC meeting and they would have attended if they were informed of it. The applicant has requested copies of the minutes. Their position is still that it does not make sense or is it practical to have a two tone sound wall. None of their other facilities have this type of wall. The only area of the wall that will be seen is that which can be viewed by those traveling from west to east on Route 126 or on West Street.

It was asked if a portion (20%) of the western face of the sound wall where there is a break could be two tone.

Bob Tynan explained that the staging and installation would have to be different if the wall is two tone. It will require more man hours for installation.

The Board expressed its appreciation for the work of the Design Review Committee but decided to not require a two tone sound wall.

The security fencing is black vinyl and noted on Sheet 3.1. It was suggested to put a note on the detail sheet 9.5

The comments about the stone walls were reviewed. A note is to be added to require saving fieldstones for reuse. There will be language about the preferred location for the recycled stones.

There is no resolution regarding the adjacent day care center

A copy of the decision draft was provided to the applicant, Board members and consultant. The findings were not included and are being reviewed by Consultant Carlucci.

Attorney Amy Kwesell suggested that in the background section of the decision something be included about the conservation commission's procedure and recommendations. It was also suggested that something be included in the procedural history about the DRC and the fact that the applicant attended 7 meetings. Susy responded that typically we do not recap the DRC meetings but there can be some language included. Also, the inter-departmental meeting which the applicant attended should be listed.

The applicant expects to get letters from Fire Chief Lynch and Sergeant Watson by the end of the week which can be referenced in the decision. It was suggested to also get something from Tom Holder about the water supply interconnection and piping. The Host Community Agreement should also be noted in the decision. It was suggested to check with Town Counsel on the wording of this.

Waivers: The Waiver Requests on pages 9-11 of the draft decision were reviewed.

### Scale of drawing:

On a motion made by Bob Tucker and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted to approve the waiver to not require the scale of the drawing be one each = 40 ft.

### **Inventory of existing landscape:**

On a motion made by Rich Di Iulio and seconded by Bob Tucker, the Board voted to approve the waiver to not require an inventory of existing landscape.

### **Curbing:**

On a motion made by Rich Di Iulio and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted to approve the waiver to allow bituminous concrete at the parking area instead of granite curbing.

### **Tree Replacement:**

On a motion made by Bob Tucker and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted unanimously to waive the tree replacement requirement.

### **Bicycle Spaces:**

The applicant indicated that there are no bicycles allowed on the facility at any time. This is for security reasons.

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Bob Tucker, the Board voted unanimously to waive the bicycle spaces as indicated in the Zoning Bylaw.

**Conditions** - The Board reviewed the Conditions starting on page 11 of the decision.

### Off Site Mitigation:

The language in this section needs to be further clarified. Amy Kwesell read a request letter from the June 17, 2016 meeting. There will be jersey barriers and making one of the ways one-way at the intersection of Beech Street and West Street. There will be signage in this area.

### Construction Traffic Management:

The Traffic Management Plan will be provided and reviewed by the police department.

### **Fuel Deliveries:**

The hours of deliveries need to be noted and confirmed. It was suggested fuel deliveries not be allowed from 7:00 am - 8:00 am and 5:00 pm - 6:00 pm. This will be consistent with the language in the Host Community Agreement.

### Fencing:

There will be language added on sheet C3.1 about the fencing. This will be black vinyl chain link including barb wire on the top of fencing.

### **Snow Storage and Removal:**

There was discussion about the language in the decision which referenced that snow needs to be removed within 24 hours. It was recommended to change this to 96 hours.

There will be language added in Conditions about dust control. It was noted that there are mitigation measures in the Host Community Agreement.

### **Construction Oversight:**

The applicant understands that there will be inspection of the infrastructure and they will provide monthly reports. There will need to be a schedule created to allow for inspections by consultants.

### Performance Security:

The applicant is aware that some form of performance security is required. The language of this security will need to be further clarified.

### **Public Hearing Continuation:**

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Rich Di Iulio, the Board voted unanimously to continue the hearing for Exelon to July 26, 2016 at 7:45 pm.

The Chairman opened the meeting at 7:00 pm.

There were no Citizen Comments.

### Tri Valley Commons Site Plan (72 Main Street) - Completion Status Report:

The Board is in receipt of the following:

• Email communication dated May 5, 2016 from Susy Affleck-Childs to the Building Inspector Jack Mee.

Developer Rich Landry and new property owner Marianne Connaughton were present.

Mr. Landry indicated that the property has been sold to Marianne Connaughton but he is responsible for completing the work shown on the approved site plan. The remaining work will be completed in three weeks. This includes the wall, hydro-seeding and temporary fence. There will need to be an extension of time for the occupancy permit past early August. The final asbuilt plans will need to be reviewed by Tetra Tech. An irrigation system was installed but the Medway DPS will not allow them to connect since there is a mandatory water ban in effect. There is a company going to the site with a water truck to care for the landscaping. There was discussion about putting in a well if the water department will not allow him to connect to the Town's system. There may need to be a further conversation with the Department of Public Works.

Susy Affleck-Childs confirmed that the bond remains in place even with the change in ownership.

Tetra Tech will review and observe what is happening with the plants.

There is an outstanding invoice from the Board in the amount of \$2,500.00 for construction services. Rich Landry will send a check out tomorrow.

Rich Landry will follow-up with the DPS and will check to see if the irrigation system was specifically called out on the site plan.

### **Extension:**

On a motion made by Bob Tucker and seconded by Rich Di Iulio, the Board voted unanimously to recommend an extension of the temporary certificate of occupancy for Tri Valley Commons for ninety days from August 5, 2016.

### <u>Direct Tire (72 Main Street) – Construction Change</u>

Direct Tire owner Barry Steinberg was present. He would like to relocate the storage unit behind the building to provide an easier way to remove tire casings. The trucks picking up the casings are having difficulty maneuvering. He proposes to have both Advance Auto and Direct Tire share one regular trash dumpster. The intent is to move the tire casings storage container to the right dumpster enclosure. He will install new, taller fencing to hide the container completely. The enclosure will extend easterly as well to accommodate the container. He will pay the expense of the dumpsters. There will be a fence around the unit. It was suggested that a letter be sent to the Board with the construction change order.

The Board did communicate that Advance Auto does not have permission to store outside. The decision states what they can and cannot do. The pallets will be where casing containers are and they could be picked up twice a week.

The Board agrees to let him go with the plans for the relocation of the tire casing storage unit.

On a motion made by Bob Tucker and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted unanimously to allow Direct Tree to relocate the storage container for tire casings and modify the fence height to completely screen the container on all four sides. (The height of the fence will be provided.

### **PEDB Meeting Minutes:**

### June 21, 2016

On a motion made by Rich Di Iulio, and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted unanimously to accept the minutes from June 21, 2016.

Susy Affleck-Childs reported that the site plan decision for this project did not require inspections by the Board's engineer.

On a motion made by Bob Tucker and seconded by Matt Hayes, the Board voted unanimously to approve the site plan completion contingent upon no negative report from the inspection by member Gay.

NOTE – The Board signed the Certificate of Completion which will be held by Susy until she receives the report from Tom Gay.

The Board was made aware that the Conservation Commission issued an Order of Conditions on June 23, 2016. There was no appeal. The draft easement deed dated July 21, 2016 was forwarded to town counsel who has recommended a title run-down.

The Board of Selectmen will need to accept the easement which can be authorized at the November 2016 fown meeting.

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Tom Gay, the Board voted unanimously to endorse the site plan dated July 18, 2016 for 2 Marc Rd.

Member Gay left the meeting at 7:51 pm.

### Exelon Expansion Site Plan - Public Hearing Continuation

Andy Ogilvie of BETA Group joined the meeting.

Amy Kewell clarified the reference points with the locations for where sound measurements were taken.

- R2 10 D Summer Street
- R3 5 Summer Street
- R4 3 West Street
- R533 West Street
- R6 55 Milford Street
- R7 Future residences

The following items in the decision were reviewed and discussed:

- Page 6: There needs to be the inclusion of the information provided at the July 26, 2016 meeting.
- Page 11: The section noted as Other Findings was suggested by Town Counsel.
- Page 15: Off-Site Mitigation will be deleted from this section.
- Page 16: Document Recording The applicant notes that it is not required by statute to record a site plan and does not think this is necessary. The Board is fine with not having the applicant record the plan.
- Page 17: Construction traffic management is covered in the Host Community Agreement and it needs to be approved by the Chief of Police.
- Page 18: The tuning for fuel leliveries will be changed to include "unless amended by the host agreement". Also change the word "will" to "shall".
- Page 20: The last bulle item #2 captures the safety protocols. It was recommended that the construction services estimate from the Town's engineering consultant include time to become sufficiently trained to meet the protocols.
- Minor Revisions: Public Hearing convened March 22, 2016 and was continued April 26, where there was no quorum present.
- There was a letter from Beals and Thomas presented about the utility pole dated July 13, 2016. This will be included in the record.

There was discussion about the language regarding the restrictions on construction activities as written on page 16. The noise bylaw was referenced and it was noted that there is no definition of "significant noise" in the decision or Host Community Agreement. The sound level report was submitted. Tammy Sanford noted that Mass DEP also has a noise policy which needs to be

adhered to. It was suggested that there needs to be a baseline established, but it is not enforceable if there is no definition of what constitutes "significant noise". The recommendation is to reference the construction management plan which shall include a definition of what constitutes significant noise levels between 6:00 and 8:00 am. This will be reviewed by the Town.

The Board discussed that unless the decision is voted tonight, there will need to be an extension of the action deadline past July 29, 2016. The applicant is not willing to grant an extension. They feel the corrections noted are not sufficient enough to warrant an extension. The Board would like to have a clean and corrected decision for review at its next meeting on August 9, 2016. After discussion, the applicant reiterated that it will not grant a deadline extension.

### Findings:

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Rich Di Iulio, the Board voted to approve the Findings (3 to 1). Bob Tucker abstained. Note passes.

### **Decision:**

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Rich Di Iulio, the Board voted unanimously to approve the Exelon decision with the amendments noted.

### Close Hearing:

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Rich D Julio, the Board voted unanimously to close the public hearing for Exelon.

### Pine Ridge - Project Completion

The Chairman communicated that he had a conversation with Paul Yorkis regarding Pine Ridge. The conversation included that the bond amount would not cover the amount of work needed to finish the project. The Chairman indicated his displeasure that the work was not completed. This was the end of conversation.

The Chairman indicated that Mr. Yorkis was provided an opportunity to come to the meeting tonight but a previous commitment made this impossible and he was not able to call in to discuss the matter.

The Board is in receipt of the following documents (See Attached):

- Notes on history of Pine Ridge, Candlewood Drive and Island Road dated July 22, 2016 prepared by Susy Affleck-Childs
- Email from DPS Director Tom Holder dated July 8, 2016 with attachments re: needed work to complete Candlewood Drive and Island Road.
- Series of emails between Susy Affleck-Childs and Paul Yorkis dated July 14, 2016
- Andy Rodenhiser letter dated July 18, 2016 to Paul Yorkis
- Paul Yorkis response letter dated July 18, 2016 to Andy Rodenhiser

The Board was provided with the history of the project along with the punch list items which need to be completed. The initial bond for Pine Ridge was put in place in March 2007 for \$70,953.00. The scope of work did include money for the emergency access but did not include the landscaping along Pine Ridge Drive and did not include the required work on Candlewood

Drive. The bond was reduced in August 2011 to \$40,000 and it did not include anything for the emergency access. The whole idea was that the work was supposed to be completed prior to the completion of Pine Ridge. There is no separate bond for Island Road. Candlewood Drive and Island Road these were two separate subdivisions.

The Board suggested waiting for communication from the applicant with a time schedule.

It was suggested to look at the actions taken by the applicant and then explore the best options of the Town. There was a recommendation to put a timeframe for completion on the various items. The applicant is the process of securing estimates for Candlewood Drive and the Island Road work. Also, the Conservation Commission will meet on Thursday regarding an Order of Conditions for the emergency access work.

It was indicated that there is no money in a Candlewood construction services account, but they have been invoiced. The as-built plans for this will eventually need to be reviewed by the Board's engineering consultant. This is at the applicant's expense. A Certificate of Completion cannot be issued until this is done.

The Board would like the various decisions sent to them so they can review prior to the next meeting.

The Board would like to extend an invitation to the developer (John Claffey) and his representative (Paul Yorkis) to the August 9, 2016 meeting so they can provide an action plan for completion.

### **OTHER BUSINESS:**

• There will be a meeting with the Economic Development Committee on August 10th or 16<sup>th</sup>.

### **ADJOURN:**

On a motion made by Matt Hayes and seconded by Rich Di Iulio, the Board voted unanimously to adjourn the meeting.

The Board spoke with Paul Yorkis via speaker phone during its June 28<sup>th</sup> meeting. The Board further discussed this matter at its July 26<sup>th</sup> meeting which Mr. Yorkis could not attend. He is planning to attend the August 9<sup>th</sup> PEDB meeting.

### **Pine Ridge Condo Development**

Developer - John Claffey

20 unit townhouse condo development located off Candlewood Drive which is off of Farm Street

14.43 acres of open space to be conveyed to the Medway Conservation Commission

OSRD Special Permit - Issued 12/20/2005

OSRD Certificate of Action – Issued 6/22/2006

OSRD Definitive Plan - Endorsed 9/26/2006

Initial subdivision bond (3/1/2007) was for \$70,953. That amount did NOT include the landscaping along Pine Ridge Drive nor the required Candlewood Drive work nor the standard 20% contingency. It did include \$9,500 for construction of the emergency access between Candlewood and Island Drive.

Bond reduction on 8/9/2011 to the minimum required \$40,000. The bond estimate did not specifically call out any amount for completion of the emergency access between Candlewood and Island Drive even though that work had not been completed.

Pine Ridge Project Status – 4/22/16 Tetra Tech Punch list

- 1. Proposed line striping and stop line has not been painted.
- 2. As-Built plan of the development needs to be submitted to PEDB for review.
- 3. It is recommended the applicant clean the drainage system. Cleaning includes removing sediment and debris from catch basin structures, pipe and detention facilities.
- 4. Erosion control measures should be removed upon receiving Certificate of Compliance from Medway Conservation Commission.
- 5. The proposed 4'-wide walking path in the open space area requires re-clearing as navigating the path is difficult. The path is inconsistent and markers are not present to direct pedestrians through the area.

Developer John Claffey needs to convey to the Town (through the Conservation Commission) the Pine Ridge open space parcel and any associated easements to allow for public access along Candlewood Drive and Pine Ridge Drive to the open space parcel and the use of several parking spaces on property now owned by the condominium association.

### Candlewood Drive Subdivision

Original Applicant - Ellen Rosenfeld

16 lot conventional subdivision located off of the west side of Farm Street. Subdivision also includes Parcel A (1.37 acre drainage parcel and connector land to Island Drive)

Subdivision Certificate of Action – Issued 3/22/1993

Subdivision Plan - Endorsed 9/14/11993. Recorded on 1/5/1994 in Plan Book 419, Plan 9A and 9B.

Ellen Rosenfeld sold the permitted subdivision to Vincent Manzelli/Marvin Development on 1/5/1994. Mr. Manzelli constructed the roadway and houses. Candlewood Drive was never accepted by the Town.

Vincent Manzelli/Marvin Development sold Candlewood Drive and Parcel A to John Claffey. Recorded on 1/24/2006 in Book 23335, Page 269. Mr. Claffey needed to own Candlewood Drive to provide access to the Pine Ridge development.

Remaining bond = \$38,000. I expect this was established by Vincent Manzelli.

### **Island Road Subdivision**

Original applicant - Ellen Rosenfeld

6 lots plus Island Road located off of the north side of Village Street.

Definitive Subdivision Plan was endorsed on 4/27/1993 and recorded on 5/7/1993 in Plan Book 413, Plan #260. Lot lines were revised via an ANR plan recorded on 8/30/1993 in Plan Book 416, Plan #574.

Ellen Rosenfeld sold house lots to Vincent Manzelli/Marvin Development on 9/14/1993. Recorded 9/24/1993 in Plan Book 10114, Page 184. It appears that Ellen Rosenfeld may have retained ownership of the roadway and reserved a 30' drainage and utility easement shown on the adjacent land. Island Road was never accepted by the Town.

Vincent Manzelli/Marvin Development sold Island Road to John Claffey. Recorded on 1/24/2006 in Book 23335, Page 269.

No bond.

Dear Paul,

I am writing to follow-up on the email communication last week between Susy Affleck-Childs and you in which she informed you that the Planning and Economic Development Board will discuss the completion status of Pine Ridge and Candlewood subdivision at its upcoming meeting on July 26<sup>th</sup>.

Based on our conversation that took place in the parking lot behind the town offices after the Redevelopment Authority meeting on July 13<sup>th</sup>, I'm required to update the Planning and Economic Development Board about that discussion regarding the Candlewood work.

I will inform the PEDB of our conversation at our next meeting on July 26<sup>th</sup> and have asked Susy Affleck-Childs to create an agenda item for a more formalized discussion. I felt it important for Susy to communicate the date to you as early as possible. I'm sorry if that's not a good time for you. Perhaps John Claffey could attend in your absence. If no representative is able to attend then we would welcome a conference call. It's certainly not unprecedented. Perhaps you could provide a schedule for completion of all the outstanding items prior to that meeting. That's also not an unprecedented request!

The Board's urgency should not be a surprise to you. We first began communicating with you about project completion in August 2014. In October 2014, you indicated that the work would be completed by the end of April 2015. That did not occur. I remember last September having similar conversations with you regarding the scheduled completion and hearing from you that the window for the 2015 construction season was closing and that the work would get completed in the spring of 2016. Then this spring we learned that a Notice of Intent had not yet been filed with the Conservation Commission and that consequently, no work can commence until an Order of Conditions is issued. Now it's July and it's still not complete although we do understand the Conservation Commission will consider the Notice of Intent at its July 28th meeting.

I feel a particular sense of urgency associated with the nature of the issues you communicated as they relate to the Town's security (as bond holder) and the Town's potential exposure to expenses for legal and construction costs. The concerns that Board members are likely going to have pertain to the bond and the cost to complete the Candlewood work that was a specific condition of the approval for the Pine

Ridge development. The permitting for Pine Ridge goes back to 2005 and 2006. The Board and the residents of the adjacent Candlewood neighborhood have been very patient.

I would like to memorialize to you that the punch list of repairs and items requiring improvement or upgrade that are being required of you, on behalf of developer John Claffey, was prepared by the people you requested - Tom Holder, the Director of Medway's DPS and Jimmy Smith, the Highway Superintendent. When this was discussed with you via telephone at the June 28<sup>th</sup> PEDB meeting, you specifically insisted that the Board not send a representative of Tetra Tech, the Town's consulting engineer, to meet on-site with Mr. Holder and Mr. Smith to review the improvement items. You even refused to pay for it if we sent Tetra Tech to that meeting/site visit, predicating your assertion against Tetra Tech's involvement with the Candlewood work on a discussion with the Board that took place years earlier.

The Board honored your request to not include Tetra Tech. That may not be the case going forward. The Board may want its engineer to review the punch list - the items that are yet to be completed or even started. This cost will likely be associated with a required action predicated on the developer's failure to complete these items under the terms of the decision which allowed Pine Ridge to be developed.

The Board could also take action to rescind its approval or ask the zoning enforcement officer to investigate the violations of the conditions of the special permit. We will likely seek the advice of counsel and then decide.

The Board may feel it's not an urgent matter and decide to wait for a more convenient time for all, but that determination will be made at our next meeting on July 26<sup>th</sup>. If the Board is ok having the discussion without you there, then that's how it will be. This is not about your feelings.

The discussion may end up being an executive session anyway. I won't know until the Board is briefed and we are afforded an opportunity to discuss this.

The patience of the Board on all of these matters is evaporating as quickly as the construction season is.

The site to be developed is an 18.34 acre parcel at 46 R Village Street, shown as Parcel 6A on Medway Assessors Map 1-4. Located in the ARII zoning district, the parcel is presently owned by Wasnewsky Realty Trust of Medway, MA. The proposed development includes the construction of a 596 linear foot private roadway off of Candlewood Drive to be known at Pine Ridge Way. The proposal includes construction of a stormwater drainage system to comply with Massachusetts DEP stormwater management requirements, extension of Town water and sewer, and conservation of 14.43 acres of open space with walking trails to be conveyed to the Town of Medway. As part of the project, the applicant will also improve Candlewood Drive and its related infrastructure including the stormwater drainage system to street acceptance standards and construct an emergency access between the end of Island Road and Candlewood Drive.

This subdivision plan was filed pursuant to an Open Space Residential Development (OSRD) Special Permit approved by the Planning Board on December 13, 2005.

#### V. ACTION ON REQUEST FOR WAIVERS OF SUBDIVISION RULES &

**REGULATIONS** – The Applicant has requested waivers from the following sections of the Subdivision Rules and Regulations, dated April 26, 2005.

SECTION 5.7.19 Proposed layout of street construction, storm drainage and stormwater management facilities, water supply, and sewage disposal system, including grades, and the proposed electric, telecommunications, natural gas, cable TV, and spare communications conduit.

FINDINGS - The applicant requests a waiver from showing the underground utility services on the definitive subdivision plan. NSTAR serves as the lead utility in Medway. It prepares the initial design for underground utilities including electric, phone and cable service. Verizon and COMCAST follow the NSTAR design, NSTAR does not begin their design process until the definitive plan is endorsed. The Planning Board finds that sufficient information has been provided for the Board to generally understand how the underground utilities will be provided. The applicant will provide the Planning Board with a copy of the NSTAR utility plan once it is completed.

SECTION 5.7.28 - Streetlights - Proposed and existing streetlights shall be shown on the plan-

FINDINGS: The applicant requests a waiver from this section as no streetlights are proposed. Instead, each dwelling unit will have at least one post light. The Planning Board finds the installation of privately owned, operated and maintained post lights in the vicinity of each driveway at the roadway will provide sufficient lighting for local street traffic.

SECTION 5.7.29 - Sidewalk Locations - Proposed sidewalks shall be shown on the plan

FINDINGS – The applicant requests a waiver from this section; no sidewalks are proposed. The Planning Board finds that Pine Ridge Way will be constructed with a 24° wide paved area, which will provide adequate area for both pedestrian and vehicular movement. In addition, at the request of the direct abutters on Candlewood Drive on each side of Pine Ridge Way, the applicant will install substantial landscaping and a berm in the Pine Ridge Way right-of-way. Such landscaping precludes construction of a sidewalk in this area.

SECTION 6.6.3 - The Board shall not grant a partial release from such security for partial completion of improvements until the following items, at a minimum, have been installed, inspected and approved by the Board or its agent:

b) binder course

FINDINGS — The applicant requests a waiver from item b) of this regulation to allow the Planning Board to grant a partial release of the Covenant prior to installation of the base coat of paving (binder course) for Pine Ridge Way. This would permit the Planning Board to authorize the Inspector of Buildings to issue a building permit that will allow the applicant to install one (1) building foundation (for four units) during infrastructure construction. The applicant has agreed that the subsequent framing on this one foundation would NOL begin until the base coat of paving is installed. The value of the binder course shall be included in calculating the bond amount. The Planning Board finds that this variation is acceptable because public safety will not be jeopardized as no occupancy is involved.

#### SECTION 6.8.1 - 6.8.4 and 6.8.6 - 6.8.11 Street Acceptance

FINDINGS - The Applicant requests waivers from these regulations as they are not applicable to roads that will be permanent private ways. The Planning Board finds that because Pine Ridge Way is going to be a permanent private way, there is no need to require compliance with the various regulations regarding street acceptance.

SECTION 7.7. 2 Stormwater Management Procedure – p) Detention and retention basins and underground infiltration systems and any related drainage structures shall be located on separate parcels and shall not be included on individual house/building loss.

FINDINGS – The applicant requests a waiver from this requirement because the proposed development is a condominium and is not being divided into separate lots. The Planning Board finds that since the entire developed portion of the property is remaining as a single parcel, this requirement is not relevant to the proposed development project.

SECTION 7.9.5 Grade a) The minimum centerline grade for any street shall not be less than two percent (2%)

FINDINGS – The applicants requests a waiver from this regulations because the existing grade and topography of Candlewood Drive, the street off which the proposed Pine Ridge Way is to be built, does not have a slope greater than one percent (1%). The Planning Board finds that complying with this requirement will necessitate greater disturbance to the topography and be counter to one of the goals of OSRD development.

SECTION 7.9.6. b) The maximum length of a dead end street shall be six-hundred feet as measured along the centerline of such street (s) from the centerline of the intersecting through street into the dead end road.

FINDINGS — The applicant requests a waiver from this regulation. The total length of the dead end street from Farm Street, along Candlewood Drive, to the beginning of Pine Ridge Way is approximately 1300 feet. This is an existing condition. The proposed Pine Ridge Way is an additional 550 feet, resulting in a total dead-end length of nearly 2000 feet. However, the planned construction of an emergency access from the end of Island Road reduces that distance to about 750 feet while also improving emergency access for existing residences on both. Candlewood Drive and Island Road. Therefore, the Planning Board finds that the improved condition for two existing neighborhoods justifies the waiver.

SECTION 7.9.7 g) Roadway shall be constructed for the full length of all streets within the subdivision... The minimum widths of the roadway pavement shall be twenty-six feet for a local street and eighteen feet for a permanent private way.

FINDINGS - The applicant requests a waiver from this regulation in order to construct a twenty-four foot wide permanent private road. The Planning Board finds that the 24 foot wide width is adequate for Pine Ridge Way since it is a permanent private way and a dead end.

SECTION 7.10.2 Curbs and Berms—Curbing shall be provided the full length of all streets along each side of the roadway. The following curb types are required for the various street categories: Permanent Private Way—Hot Mix Asphalt Cape God Berm: Local Street—Sloped Granite Curb (Type S-B):

FINDINGS — The applicant requests a waiver from this regulation in order to construct hot mix asphalt Cape Cod berm on each side of the permanent private way. The Planning Board finds that the hot mix asphalt cape cod berm is adequate because Pine Ridge Way is a permanent private way that will not be maintained by the Town.

SECTION 7.13.2 - Sidewalks shall extend the full length of the street and around the entire perimeter of the cul-de-sac, with pedestrian ramps at both ends of the cul-de-sac entry.

FINDINGS - The applicant requests a waiver from this requirement. The Planning Board finds that Pine Ridge Way will have a 24' paved area, which will provide adequate area for pedestrian and vehicular movement. In addition, at the request of the direct abutters on Candlewood Drive on each side of Pine Ridge Way, the applicant will install substantial landscaping and a berm in the Pine Ridge Way right-of-way which precludes construction of a sidewalk in this area.

SECTION 7.19.2 Street Trees - To enhance the aesthetic quality of the streetscape, deciduous street trees of nursery stock — shall be planted on each side of the street in a subdivision, except in those locations where the Board has approved certain trees to be retained which are healthy and are of adequate size and species. Street trees shall be located on private property at least six feet (6') from the roadway layout. At least three trees are to be located on each lot at approximately forty foot (40') intervals and shall be planted no more than twenty feet (20') from the right-of-way line.

FINDINGS — The applicant requests a waiver from this regulation as a landscaping plan is included in the plan set pursuant to the OSRD Special Permit. The Planning Board finds that the landscape plan included on sheets 7 and 8 of 14 provides adequate new tree planting comparable to the requirement of Section 7/19/2.

#### SECTION 7.21 Streetlights

FINDINGS - The applicant requests a waiver from this section as no streetlights are proposed. Instead, each dwelling unit will have at least one post light. The Planning Board finds the installation of privately owned, operated and maintained post lights in the vicinity of each driveway at the readway will provide sufficient lighting for local street traffic.

#### MITIGATION PLAN -- As part of this project, the applicant shall carry out the following:

- 1. Contribute \$1,000.00 to the Town of Medway Fire Department in lieu of installing a fire alarm box.
- 2. Improve Candlewood Drive, as specified in the punch list dated March 5, 2001, prepared by VHB, Inc. (Exhibit A) and as shown on Sheet 14 of 14 of the definitive subdivision plan.
- 3. Construct an emergency access between the end of Island Road and Candlewood Drive as shown on Sheet 14 of 14 of the definitive subdivision plan and as described in correspondence from Fire Chief Wayne Vinton dated 9/22/05 and 10/11/05 (Exhibit B).
- 4. Install landscaping on private property at 12 and 14 Candlewood Drive, in the right-of-way of Pine Ridge Way adjacent to 12 and 14 Candlewood Drive, and on the applicant's property adjacent to 12, 14 and 16 Candlewood Drive, as shown on Sheet 7 of 14 of the definitive subdivision plan.

Action on Waiver FINDINGS - At a duly called and properly posted meeting of the Medway Planning Board held on June 22, 2006, a motion was made by Chan Rogers and seconded by Karyl Spiller-Walsh to approve the above noted Waiver Findings. The motion was approved by a vote of 4 in favor and 0 opposed.

Action on Mitigation Plan - At a duly called and properly posted meeting of the Medway Planning Board held on June 22, 2006, a motion was made by Karyl Spiller-Walsh and seconded by Chan Rogers to approve the above noted Mitigation Plan. The motion was approved by a vote of 4 in favor and 0 opposed.

Action on Waiver Request – At a duly called and properly posted meeting of the Medway Planning Board held on June 22, 2006, a motion was made by Karyl Spiller-Walsh and seconded by Chan Rogers to grant the above noted Waivers from the Subdivision Rules and Regulations. The motion was approved by a vote of 4 in favor and 0 opposed.

- VI. PROJECT EVALUATION CRITERIA—Before taking action on a Definitive Subdivision Plan, the Board shall evaluate the proposed subdivision according to the following criteria as specified in Section 5.16 of the Subdivision Rules and Regulations. At a duly called and properly posted meeting of the Medway Planning Board held on June 22, 2006, a motion was made by Karyl Spiller-Walsh and seconded by Chan Rogers to approve the Project Evaluation Findings noted below.
  - 5.16.1 Completeness and technical accuracy of all submissions.

Findings – The Planning Board finds that the submissions were complete and technically accurate.

5.16.2 Determination that the street pattern is safe and convenient and that proper provision is made for street extension. The Board may disapprove a plan where it determines that dangerous traffic or unsafe conditions may result from the inadequacy of the proposed ways within the subdivision.

Findings - The proposed new roadway is of adequate width and has adequate sight distance on an existing dead end road with little traffic. The abutting property is the site of the Charles River Pollution Control District facility so there is no need for future extension. Construction of an emergency access between Island Road and Candlewood Drive improves safety for both existing residences on those streets and future residents of the Village at Pine Ridge. Therefore, the Planning Board finds that this criterion is met.

5.16.3 Determination that development at this location does not entail unwarranted hazard to the safety, health and convenience of future residents of the development or of others because of possible natural disaster, traffic hazard or other environmental degradation.

Findings – As an OSRD development, the project is limiting disturbance to the natural topography and preserving open space. Construction of an emergency access between Island Road and Candlewood Drive improves safety for both existing residences on those streets and future residents of the Village at Pine Ridge. Therefore, the Planning Board finds that this criterion is met.

5.16.4 Determination, based on the environmental impact analysis, where submitted, that the subdivision as designed will not cause substantial and irreversible damage to the environmental, which damage could be avoided or ameliorated through an alternative development plan.

Findings – As an OSRD, the proposed development does represent an alternative development style that limits damage to the environment and preserves open space. The Planning Board finds that this criterion is satisfied.

5.16.5 Determination that the roads and ways leading to and from the subdivision shall be adequate to provide emergency medical, fire and police protection as well as safe travel for the projected volume of traffic. The Board may disapprove a plan where it determines that dangerous traffic or unsafe conditions may result from the inadequacy of the proposed access or of any ways adjacent to or providing access to the subdivision.

Findings – The proposed new roadway is of adequate width and has adequate sight distance on an existing dead end road with little traffic. Construction of an emergency access between Island Road and Candlewood Drive improves safety for both existing residences on those streets and future residents of the Village at Pine Ridge. Therefore, the Planning Board finds that this criterion is met.

5.16.6 Conformity with all applicable requirements of the Medway Zoning By-Law including but not limited to minimum area and frontage standards.

Findings – The Planning Board finds that this criterion is met since the proposed development complies with the requirements of the OSRD provisions of the Zoning Bylaw.

5.16.7 Consistency with the purposes of the Subdivision Control Law.

Findings - The proposed development will result in a new road that meets applicable safety and construction standards and a drainage system that also complies with applicable regulations and minimizes impacts. The Planning Board finds that the project is consistent with the purposes of the Subdivision Control Law.

VII. DECISION – At a duly called and properly posted meeting of the Medway Planning Board held on June 22, 2006, a motion was made by Chan Rogers and seconded by Karyl Spiller-Walsh to approve the Village at Pine Ridge Open Space Definitive Subdivision Plan, prepared by FAIST Engineering and O'Driscoll Land Surveying, Inc., dated March 28, 2006, last revised May 25, 2006, subject to the Specific and General Conditions as specified herein and with Waivers from the following sections of the Subdivision Rules and Regulations dated April 26, 2005:

The motion was approved by a vote of 4 in favor (Rogers, Rodenhiser, Schroeder and Spiller-Walsh) and 0 opposed.

VIII. CONDITIONS - The following specific and general conditions shall apply to the Applicant, its executors, administrators, devisees, heirs, successors and assigns:

#### Specific Conditions

1. It is expressly understood that this development is authorized for Parcels B and C and the parcel between Parcel B and Candlewood Drive, all as shown on the definitive plan. Parcel B shall have no more than twenty (20) dwelling units. The parcel between Parcel B and Candlewood Drive shall be combined with Parcel B prior to plan endorsement. As a permanent condition of this plan, no further subdivision of Parcels B and C will be allowed. It is expected that Parcel C, the open space parcel, will be conveyed to the Town of Medway, subject to approval of the Board of Selectmen or Town Meeting. Otherwise, another entity acceptable to the Planning Board must agree to the land donation. If conveyed to another entity, a conservation restriction in compliance with the Open

Space Residential Development (OSRD) provisions of the Medway Zoning Bylaw and acceptable to the Planning Board is required.

- 2. The Applicant shall construct the roadway and all related infrastructure including the stormwater management system, and install all utilities as shown on the definitive subdivision plan, to the satisfaction of the Planning Board, within two (2) years of the date of endorsement of the plan.
- 3. Prior to endorsement, the cover sheet of the plan set shall be revised to include the following:
  - a. The final plan revision date
  - b. List of approved waivers
  - c. Updated index
- 4. Prior to endorsement, the plan shall be revised to include the following:
  - a. Any changes as specified in the June 5, 2006 letter from Paul Carter, VHB, Inc.
  - b. Drawings of façade elevations
  - c. Construction details/specifications for the new part of the trail.
  - d. Post light locations and design specifications
- 5. Prior to endorsement, the plan shall be revised to incorporate all conditions as specified in this Certificate of Action. The Applicant shall provide such revised plan to the Planning Board and the Town's Consulting Engineer for review and approval. All conditions of this Certificate of Action must be addressed to the satisfaction of the Town's Consulting Engineer and the Planning Board before the Planning Board will endorse the definitive subdivision plan.
- 6. Unit Deeds Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall provide the Planning Board with copies of a sample deed to be used to convey or transfer each dwelling unit for review, comment, amendment and approval by Town Counsel. Each deed shall clearly state that the Village at Pine Ridge Condominium Trust shall own and be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of Pine Ridge Way, a permanent private way, and the stormwater management system.
- 7. Easement Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall provide the Planning Board with a copy of the proposed easement to allow public use and passage on Candlewood Drive, Pine Ridge Way and the small parking area and trails on Parcel B.
- 8. Open Space Deed Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall provide the Planning Board with a copy of the proposed deed to convey Parcel C to the Town of Medway, or another suitable entity, for review, comment, amendment and approval by Town Counsel. If conveyed to a party other than the Town of Medway, the conveyance shall be subject to a conservation restriction to ensure that the land remains as open space and accessible to the public in perpetuity. The conservation restriction shall be in a form acceptable to the Planning Board and Town Counsel and shall comply with the Open Space Residential Development (OSRD) provisions of the Medway Zoning Bylaw.
- 9. Document/Plan Recording Within thirty (30) days of recording the endorsed definitive subdivision plan and the Subdivision Covenant with the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds, the Applicant or his assign shall provide the Planning Board with a receipt from the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds indicating that all documents have been duly recorded, or supply another alternative verification that such recording has occurred.
- 10. Maintenance Responsibility During Construction The Applicant shall provide for snow plowing, sanding and full maintenance of Pine Ridge Way and all related stormwater management infrastructure throughout the entire construction process.

- 11. Fire Alarm In lieu of installing a fire alarm box, the applicant will contribute \$1,000 to the Medway Fire Department by April 7, 2007.
- 12. Foundation Construction The Planning Board authorizes the applicant to seek a building permit to enable him to install one (1) building foundation (for 4 dwelling units) prior to installation of the base coat of paving (binder course) on Pine Ridge Way. The estimated cost for the binder course shall be included in the bond amount, which the applicant shall be required to post before the Planning Board authorizes the release.
- Candlewood Drive Improvements As part of this approval, the applicant shall improve Candlewood Drive, as specified in the punch list dated March 5, 2001, prepared by VHB, Inc. (Exhibit A) and construct an emergency access between the end of Island Road and Candlewood Drive as described in correspondence from Fire Chief Wayne Vinton dated 9/22/05 and 10/11/05 (Exhibit B).
- 14. Condominium Documents Prior to endorsement, the condominium documents shall be revised, to the satisfaction of the Planning Board and Town Counsel, to address the deficiencies specified in the June 14, 2006 letter from Town Counsel Richard D. Maciolek (Exhibit C.)

#### General Conditions

- 15. Expiration of Appeal Period Prior to endorsement, the Planning Board must receive the statutory notification of the expiration of the twenty (20) day appeal period from the Town Clerk's office.
- 16. Payment of Balance of Fees/Taxes Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall pay the balance of any outstanding plan review services by any outside consultants retained by the Planning Board and any other outstanding expenses, obligations or fees due the Town of Medway pertaining to these properties. The Applicant shall also provide proof from the Medway Town Treasurer/ Collector that all real estate taxes are current for all property included in this subdivision.
- 17. Establishment of Bond Account Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall establish a statement savings account (with the Town of Medway) at an area financial institution with which the Applicant will place a cash bond. A minimum of \$100 shall be deposited to the account at the time it is established. The Applicant shall provide the Medway Treasurer with a signed withdrawal slip for said account.
- 18. Covenant Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall sign a Covenant, on a form provided by the Planning Board, to be reviewed and approved by Town Counsel, to secure construction of the ways and all related infrastructure and installation of utilities and services as specified in the approved subdivision plan. Reference to the Covenant shall be noted on the cover sheet of the Definitive Subdivision Plan. The Covenant shall specify that the roadway and all relevant infrastructure including the stormwater management system shall be constructed and all utilities and services shall be installed to the satisfaction of the Planning Board within two (2) years of the date of plan endorsement.
- 19. Bond At such time as the Applicant wishes to secure a building permit for any structure within the development, the security provided by the Covenant shall be replaced by a cash bond. Prior to the Planning Board's approval of the Release of Covenant for the first building permit, the Applicant shall deposit certified funds in the already established bank account with the Town of Medway in an amount equal to 100% of the amount that would be required for the Town of Medway to complete

construction improvements and infrastructure maintenance if the Applicant failed to do so. The bond amount shall be approved by the Planning Board based on an estimate provided by the Town's Consulting Engineer. Final bond release is contingent on submission of an as-built plan that documents compliance with the endorsed definitive plan.

20. Order of Conditions - Prior to endorsement, the Applicant shall provide the Planning Board with a copy of any and all "Order of Conditions" as issued by the appropriate agency, and recorded by the Applicant, pursuant to the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act. Any changes to the Definitive Plan that may be required under the "Order of Conditions" shall be presented to the Planning Board by the Applicant, for review and approval as a modification to the Definitive Plan. The Planning Board reserves the right to negotiate with the issuing authority any mutually acceptable modifications to the "Order of Conditions" that may be deemed appropriate by the Planning Board and the Town's Consulting Engineer. After the public hearing and acceptance of the modifications to the plan, the Planning Board shall take action on the modified plan, reporting said action to the Town Clerk. The statutory notification of the expiration of the twenty (20) day appeal period must be received from the Town Clerk's office before the Planning Board endorses the plan modification.

Additionally, upon issuance of any "Order of Conditions" requiring further individual filings under the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, the Applicant shall prepare an amended plan clearly identifying the lots requiring further action under the Wetlands Protection Act. The Applicant shall provide this plan for endorsement by the Planning Board and shall provide a receipt from the Registry of Deeds indicating that the endorsed amended plan has been duly recorded.

- 21. Construction Observation Inspection of roadway and infrastructure construction by the Town's Consulting Engineer is required. Prior to plan endorsement, the Applicant shall pay a construction observation fee to the Town of Medway for such inspections. The amount shall be determined by the Planning Board based on an estimate provided by the Town's Consulting Engineer. A construction observation account shall be established with the Medway Planning Board prior to plan endorsement. The Applicant shall provide supplemental payments to the Town of Medway, for reasonable construction inspection services, upon invoice from the Planning Board, until the road construction and stormwater drainage system are completed, municipal services are installed, and the as-built plan has been reviewed and determined to be satisfactory for filing with the Town.
- 22. Within thirty (30) days of plan endorsement, the Applicant shall provide the Town with a set of the approved plan in 11" x 17" paper format. The Applicant shall also provide the approved plan in CAD format compatible with the Medway GIS and acceptable to the Medway Board of Assessors (ArcInfo shape file .shp). The Applicant shall pay any reasonable associated costs, as may be determined by the Board of Selectmen, to update the Medway GIS/Assessor's maps relative to this subdivision.
- 23. Proof of Taxes Paid Prior to the Planning Board's approval of the Release of Covenant for the first building lot, the Applicant shall provide proof from the Medway Town Treasurer/Collector that all real estate taxes and other fees due the Town of Medway are current to that date for all property included in this subdivision.
- 24. As-Built Plans The Applicant agrees to prepare and provide as-built construction plans prepared in accordance with the approved subdivision plan and with the Subdivision Rules and Regulations in effect at the time the as-built plans are submitted, to the satisfaction of the Planning Board. The Applicant shall provide the final as-built plan in CAD format compatible with the Medway GIS

and acceptable to the Medway Board of Assessors (ArcInfo shape file - .shp). The Applicant shall pay any reasonable associated costs, as may be determined by the Board of Selectmen, to update the Medway GIS/Assessor's maps relative to this subdivision.

28. Compliance - All construction shall be as specified in the approved definitive subdivision plan and in full compliance with the Subdivision Rules and Regulations and all applicable local, state and federal laws, including but not limited to the Americans with Disabilities Act, the NPDES permit requirements, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Stormwater Management Policy requirements, MEPA requirements, the Massachusetts Wetland Protection Act (Chapter 131, Section 40, M.G.L.) and the regulations of the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board for handicap accessibility.

The completion and acceptance of the as-built plan and the following items of work are required for street acceptance at the next town meeting.

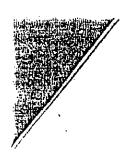
### Subdivision Inspection of completed work:

The applicant shall address the following items as soon as the weather conditions permit and in advance of the next town meeting.

The applicant will field locate the following three concrete bounds for inspection by VHB. P.C. Sta  $2+50 \pm/-$ , 25' Rt. P.C. Sta  $17+23 \pm/-$ , 25' Rt. P.T. Sta  $3+65 \pm/-$ , 25' Rt.

The applicant will repair the small depression in the roadway pavement (4" diameter, 1-1/2" deep) near the catch basin at  $\text{Sta }2\div80\div/\text{-}$  Rt. by sawcutting a square area to receive the patch, adequately compacting and replacing the subgrade material below and installing a 1 ½ inch thick bit. conc. patch.

The applicant will seal and backsand the bituminous concrete joints at Sta 11+05+/- and Sta 17+40+/-.

The applicant will completely sweep Candlewood drive.

The applicant will flush the entire drainage system (pipes, structures, detention basin and gutter inlets) to remove excess sediment material.

The applicant shall remove the excess sedimentation material in the detention basin to the proposed base elevation. Also, clean out the 18" diameter inlet pipe from the DMH @ Sta 9+62 +/- Lt, to the headwall.

The applicant will replace the lightweight frame and cover for the drain manhole @ Sta 3+15 +/- Lt. located in the private driveway. Also the applicant will install all of the steps from frame to invert as required and fill lift holes with mortar.

The applicant will install a 1 foot concrete riser section and adjust to grade with brick and mortar (6" $\pm$ ) for the drain manhole @ Sta  $4+85\pm$ /- Lt.

The applicant will replace the 2' riser section of the drain manhole @ Sta 6+20 +/- Lt. with a 1' riser section and adjust to the proper grade with brick and mortar.

The applicant will install a gas trap on the 3" diameter PVC drainpipe in the catch basin @ Sta 9+40 +/- Rt.

The applicant will realign the frame and cover for the manhole @ Sta 10+67+/-Lt. to better align the frame with the structure opening.

The applicant will install a gas trap on the 4'' diameter PVC drainpipe in the catch basin @ Sta 11+00+/- Rt.

The applicant will realign the frame and cover for the sewer manhole @ Sta 14+40 +/-, Lt.' to better align the frame over the structure opening.

The applicant will install a gas trap on the 4'' diameter PVC drainpipe in the catch basin @ Sta 14+45+/- Lt.

The bond will not be reduced until each of the above items have been addressed by the applicant and the roadway has been accepted by the Town of Medway.

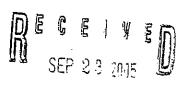

I have reviewed your letter dated June 7, 2006 together with the various documents forwarded with it and take this opportunity to answer the questions that you raise in your letter.

It is my opinion that none of the documents referenced state, clearly or otherwise, that the Town will not own or maintain the road or drainage system. First, only 2.12 acres of land are being transferred into the Condominium Association. In addition to the 2.12 acres there is a 20' wide Access Easement being submitted pursuant to the Master Deed. According to the Special Permit, the development area will encompass 3.91 acres of land. Without specific reference to the plans, I am unable to determine which part or portion of the development area is not being transferred to the Condominium Association.

There are only two areas in the documents that make reference to the roadways and drainage system. In the Master Deed, Section 3,  $5^{\rm th}$  paragraph, indicating that the premises are subject to the rights of others to use the road shown on that plan in common with others now or hereafter entitled to such use. It does not define who "the others" are nor does it limit the "hereafter" in any fashion.

The only other reference is contained in the Rules and Regulations, Paragraph C.c. indicates that the Trustees are responsible for the care and maintenance of all of the common areas which include the roadways and drainage systems. However, that does not indicate that the roadways and drainage systems will never be taken over by the Town and it certainly does not reference any

roadways or portions of the drainage system which are not included in the 2.12 acres that are being made subject to the condominium pursuant to G.L. c.183A.

In summary, it is my opinion that there is nothing in these documents that will clearly inform potential condominium owners that they and not the Town are ultimately responsible for ownership and maintenance of the roads and drainage systems.

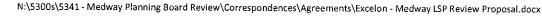

# DRAFT Proposed Definitions for WORDS ALREADY INCLUDED in the USE TABLE BUT NOT YET DEFINED IN THE ZONING BYLAW

#### A. AGRICULTURE/CONSERVATION/RECREATION

Boathouse - A building or shed, usually built partly over water, for sheltering a boat or boats

**Golf Course** – A tract of land laid out for playing the game of golf and improved with tees, greens, fairways and hazards and that may include a clubhouse and shelter

**Gravel/loam/sand or stone removal –** The removal from land of any form of soil including sod, loam, sand, gravel, clay, peat hardpan, rock, quarried stone or mineral products

**Greenhouse** – A building whose roof and sides are made largely of glass or other transparent or transluscent material and in which the temperature and humidity can be regulated for the cultivation of plants for subsequent sale or for personal enjoyment

**Livery Riding Stable** – A structure designed for the feeding, housing, and exercising of horses not owned by the owner of the premises and for which the owner of the premises receives compensation.

Nonprofit Recreational Use - See "Recreational Facility" below to use instead

**Recreational Facility** — A public or private establishment designed and equipped for the conduct of sports and leisure-time activities including but not limited to fields, courts, pools, tracks, golf course/driving range, and other similar uses and including a clubhouse and other customary accessory uses, and which may include indoor and outdoor facilities.

Recreational Facility, Commercial – A recreational facility operated as a business and open to the general public for a fee.

Recreational Facility, Personal – A recreational facility established as an accessory use located on the same lot as the principal residential use and designed to be used primarily by the occupants of the principal use and their guests

Recreational Facility, Private – A recreational facility operated by a nonprofit organization and open only to bona fide members and guests of such organization

Sawmill - A place or building in which timber is sawed into planks, boards, etc., by machinery

NOTE – Do you want to allow this use anywhere!?!? Perhaps add sawmill to the list of Prohibited uses?

#### Ski Tow - Suggest replacing "ski tow" with "ski area"

Ski Area - An area developed for snow skiing with trails and which may include lifts, ski rentals and sales, instruction and eating facilities

#### **B. PUBLIC SERVICE**

**Government Facility** – Any building, structure, facility or complex used by the general public and operated by any state or county, or agency or instrumentality thereof such as but not limited to schools, libraries, police stations, fire stations, senior centers, office buildings, parks, playgrounds, fields, community centers, garages and other public works facilities, and other similar governmental uses.

Municipal Use - Any use or facility operated by the Town of Medway

#### C. RESIDENTIAL/INSTITUTIONAL USE

Infill dwelling unit – As specified in Section 8.1

Open space residential development - As specified in Section 8.4

#### **D. BUSINESS USES**

#### **Retail Trade**

**Auto Body** - An establishment in which bodies for vehicles, such as automobiles, trucks, or the like, are manufactured, repaired, etc.

**Building Materials** – Natural materials and man-made products which are used for construction purposes including but not limited to lumber, plumbing, heating, ventilating, air conditioning, insulation, roofing and electrical products.

Florist - An establishment which sells flowers and plants and accessory items thereto

**Motor Vehicle** – A self-propelled device used for the transportation of people or goods over land surfaces

**Trailer** - A non-motorized vehicle, often a long platform or box/container with two or more wheels, which is pulled behind a motorized vehicle and used to transport things.

Boat - A vessel of any size built for navigation on a river or other body of water

**Farm Equipment –** Equipment and implements that are used or intended for use in farming operations, including any combine, tractor, engine, motor or attachment including but not limited to a cultivator, tiller, harvester, reaper, hay conditioner, haymaker, thrasher thresher, but not including a motor vehicle.

Nursery - Land or greenhouses used to raise flowers, shrubs, and plants for sale

NOTE – Move this term to the AGRICULTURE section of the USE Table.

**Soldering Shop** – An establishment providing the fusing and application of various alloys to firmly join metal objects or surfaces together without heating the objects to the melting point.

**Welding shop** – An establishment providing the joining of metal pieces or parts by heating the surfaces to the point of melting using a blowtorch, electric arc or other means, and uniting them by hammering, compressing, or the like.

#### **Cultural/Entertainment**

Studios for artists, photographers, interior decorators

**Change this to "Studio"** – A building, room or space where a craftsperson, artist, sculptor, photographer, musician or other artisan or designer works.

Gallery - A building, room or space for the display or sale of works of art

#### **Professional Use and Financial Services**

**Financial Institution** – Establishments such as banks, savings and loans, credit unions, for the receiving, lending, exchanging and safeguarding of money and which may include issuing loads and transacting other financial business.

#### <u>Services</u>

Barber Shop - Recommend this be deleted from Use Table

Beauty shop - Recommend this be deleted from Use Table

Nail Salon - Recommend this be deleted from Use Table

**Commercial indoor amusement/recreation** - A business establishment engaged in providing entertainment for a fee to the general public and including but not limited to such activities as dance halls, bowling alleys, billiard and pool establishments, and other similar uses.

**Dry Cleaner** – A business establishment where clothes, fabrics, textiles and other cloth items are cleaned with dry-cleaning chemical solvents instead of water.

**Fitness Facility** — An establishment providing exercise space, equipment and classes for the purposes of physical exercise and athletic recreation. Commonly referred to as a fitness club, health club, fitness center, and gym.

#### Funeral home/undertaker -

Note – Delete use of term "undertaker". Change this to just "Funeral Home" – A building used for the preparation of the deceased for burial and the display of the deceased and rituals connected thereto before burial or cremation and which may include a crematorium.

#### Laundry

NOTE – Recommend changing this to "Laundromat" – An establishment providing self-service washing, drying or dry-cleaning machines on the premises for rental use to the general public.

**Optician** – A business establishment where eyeglasses and contact lenses are made and/or supplied to correct vision

**Outdoor Dining** - Tables and seating available for restaurant-style eating outdoors, usually on the sidewalk or an open area adjacent to its affiliated restaurant, often on a seasonal basis.

**Personal Care Service establishment** – A business establishment providing personal services to individuals including but not limited to a barber shop, beauty shop, hair salon, nail salon, cosmetology and spa services, and other similar services.

**Photocopying/printing** – A business establishment that offers photocopying, printing and ancillary services

#### Repair shop for small equipment, bicycles, tools and appliances

NOTE – Shorten this to "Repair Shop" - A business establishment where broken machines, equipment, tools and appliances can be taken to be repaired.

**Shoe repair** – A business establishment where shoes, boots and other footwear can be taken to be repaired and which may offer shoe polishing and cleaning services and may sell footwear accessories.

**Tailor** – A business establishment where clothes and garments are made, mended or altered for individual customers

**Veterinary Hospital** – A building where animals are given medical care and the boarding of animals is limited to short-term care incidental to the hospital use.

#### E. INDUSTRIAL AND RELATED USES

**Distribution Facility** – A business engaged in the receipt, storage, and redistribution of goods, products, cargo and materials to retailers, to wholesalers, or directly to consumers.

**Electric Power Generation** – The process of generating electric power from other sources of primary energy such as electromechanical generators, heat engines fueled by chemical combustion, kinetic energy such as flowing water and wind, and other energy sources such as solar photovoltaic and geothermal power.

**Indoor Storage** – An area within a building for the placement and safe keeping of things not being used for easy access for future use.

**Outdoor Display –** The temporary (less than 24 hours) display of goods and products sold by the business establishment, located on the same premises but not including any parking, delivery or loading areas, fire lanes, maneuvering aisles, or sidewalks where less than 6 feet of sidewalk width remains for pedestrian access, and limited to the hours the business is open.

**Outdoor Storage** – An outside area for the storage or display of materials, goods or manufactured products produced or used by the principal use of the property, for more than a twenty-four hour period.

Warehouse – A building or area used primarily for the storage of raw materials and/or manufactured goods before their export or distribution for sale.

**Wholesale Showroom -** A room or space used for displaying a company's products, goods and merchandise not for direct sale to consumers

# WORDS TO CONSIDER DEFINING, some of which should be added to the USE TABLE\*

**Auto Parts Store** – An establishment selling various components which are used to build or repair automotive vehicles and keep them performing safely and efficiently. May also include associated supplies and tools for the maintenance and upkeep of motor vehicles and various automotive accessories.

- \*Bar/Tavern Premises used primarily for the sale or dispensing of liquor by the drink to the general public for on-site consumption and where food may be available for consumption on the premises as accessory to the principal use.
- \*Brewery A building or establishment that uses equipment and/or processes for the brewing of beer or other malt liquors.

**Buffer** – Open spaces, landscaped area, fences, walls, berms, or any combination thereof used to physically separate or screen one use or property from another so as to visually shield or block noise, lights or other nuisances.

- \*Campground An area, whether privately or publicly owned, used on a daily, nightly, weekly or longer basis with campsites for the temporary accommodation of five or more tents or recreational camping vehicles, for recreation or vacation purposes, free of charge or for compensation.
- \*Child Care Facility As defined in MGL, chapter 15D, section 1A.
- \*Community Center A building used for recreational, social, educational, and cultural activities, open to the public or a designated part of the public, usually owned and operated by a public or nonprofit group or agency.
- \*Educational Facility, non-profit Any building or part thereof which is designed, constructed or used for education or instruction in any branch of knowledge or skill, organized on a non-profit basis or operated on land owned or leased by the commonwealth or any of its agencies, subdivisions, or body politic, or by a religious sect or denomination, or by a nonprofit educational corporation.
- \*Educational/Instructional Facility, commercial Any building or part thereof which is designed, constructed or used for education or instruction in any branch of knowledge or skill, organized on a commercial basis including but not limited to schools for dance, gymnastics, martial arts, vocational and technical training,

<sup>\*</sup>Family Day Care Home - As defined in MGL, chapter 15D, section 1A.

- \*Group Home Small, residential facility designed to serve and care for children or adults with chronic disabilities, of whom one or more are unrelated. These homes usually have six or fewer occupants and are staffed 24 hours a day by trained caregivers.
- \*Inn An establishment that provides temporary lodging, not to exceed 20 rooms, for transient guests and where a dining room serving meals may be operated on the premises, and wherein the owner or operator may or may not maintain a place of principal residence.
- \*Lodge or Club A facility operated by a private organization such as a fraternal, civic, alumni, social or sports club, or other similar organization, to which membership is limited or controlled.
- \*Nursery Land used to raise flowers, shrubs and plants for sale or transplanting. May include greenhouses.
- \*Recreational Camp The use of land operated continuously for a period of five days or more each year to provide seasonal, organized youth and/or family oriented programs including indoor and outdoor recreational and educational activities and which may include overnight sleeping accommodations and dining services.
- \*Religious Facility A structure, building or place used by a religious sect or denomination for worship, ceremonies, rituals, assembly, and education pertaining to a particular system of religious beliefs. This definition may include church, cathedral, convent, monastery, mosque, shrine, synagogue or temple and other places of religious worship, and a parish house and similar facilities whose purpose is substantially related to the religious purposes of such sect or denomination.

Wholesale - The business of selling things in large quantities to other businesses for resale rather than to individual customers.

### WORDs to consider changing the definition for:

#### Retail Sales Store -

Manufacturing – The transformation of raw materials or substances, components or parts into new products by the use of machines, tools, and labor through a mechanical, chemical or other process. Also includes the blending of materials and the assembly of component parts and the packaging of products for distribution, storage and sale.
